Title and the author.
Main Conflict (There may be more than one.)
Setting (Include time, place, and historical significance if any)
Main characters (Give a brief description of each one- physical and emotional)
A brief summary (think basic plot structure)
Personal connection or biblical connection to the novel
Your general opinion of the book supported by evidence from the book (Max of one paragraph)
Any other literary elements that you notice and feel are noteworthy
